Big Lottery Fund

Big Lottery Fund has wide ranging grants programmes that aim to make real improvements to communities and the lives of people most in need. They want to support projects that develop people's skills, promote community involvement and encourage healthier lifestyles.

Awards for All Wales

Awards for All Wales funds projects that involve people in their local community, bringing them together and enabling them to take part in community activities and projects that promote education, the environment and health in the local community.

Grants of between £500 and £5,000 are available.

There are no deadlines of closing dates for Awards for All Wales.

People and Places

People and Places aims to bring people together to make their communities stronger and to improve their rural and urban environments. This programme will support people working together to make their communities better places to live. It will support local and regional projects and projects that work throughout Wales.

People and Places can fund projects that achieve one or more of the following programme outcomes:

- revitalised communities
- improved community relations
- enhanced local environments, community services and buildings.

This programme is open to the community, voluntary and public sector. Money will be available for capital and revenue projects and can be used for the development of communities or communities of interest in Wales.

Community Asset Transfer

The Community Asset Transfer programme aims to help communities become stronger and more sustainable by assisting them to obtain and develop assets such as land or buildings.

The CAT programme is a strategic programme focused on enabling communities to have more control and influence over their future. Through the CAT programme, BIG will invest up to £13 million in communities to help them transfer, develop, manage, and sustain assets to improve their livelihoods and neighbourhoods.

Assets should be used to generate income streams and provide quality services and amenities that are economically, socially and environmentally viable and sustainable in the long-term.
